*A Critical Exploration of the Anthropology of Contemporary Mesoamerica:
A View from the Ontological Turn*

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In this course, we will explore the cultural specificity or ethnocentricity of our supposedly universally applicable concepts and theories and how their unreflective use distorts our understanding of the people we work with and write about. As an alternative, I will propose a symmetrical dialogue between the knowledge practices of contemporary Mesoamerican peoples and those of socio-cultural anthropology. Undoubtedly, this critical reflection on some of the discipline's basic categories (e.g. culture, society, kinship, gender) is challenging since it forces us to confront the limitations of ways of being and thinking we usually assume to be objective and beyond inquiry. However, the challenge is worth the effort. It offers conceptual liberty to better understand the multicultural world in which we live and to begin to imagine novel solutions to the social problems currently plaguing Mexico and the world. I will draw on the critical thinking of anthropologists such as Roy Wagner, Marilyn Strathern and Eduardo Viveiros de Castro, and on my own research as well as that of others who have applied this kind of critique in their research on contemporary Mesoamerica.
